## Astronomers Knew Explosion Was Special

At first, astronomers weren't sure of the exact scale of the AT2021lwx explosion, but they knew right away that it was something special.

"For something to be bright for two plus years was immediately very unusual," said Philip Wiseman, a research fellow at the University of Southampton, who led the research.

It was only when astronomers, including Wiseman, looked at the explosion through more powerful telescopes that they realized what they had on their hands. They determined that the explosion was roughly 8 billion light-years away. A light-year is the distance light travels in one year, which is about 5.88 trillion miles (9.48 trillion kilometers). Light-years are a measurement used to represent great distances, such as those in outer space.

Eight billion light-years is much farther than most other new flashes of light in the sky, which means the explosion behind it must be far greater. Astronomers estimate that the "Scary Barbie" explosion is about 2 trillion times brighter than the sun.

AT2021lwx has earned the nickname "Scary Barbie" due to its "terrifying energy," according to researchers. The scientists said that explosions like this one are very rare and nothing on this scale has been witnessed before.

According to Danny Milisavljevic, a scientist at Purdue University, AT2021lwx was first assigned a random name of numbers and letters when discovered: ZTF20abrbeie. The "Scary Barbie" nickname came from its designation "abrbeie" and "scary" because of its power.

## Slide 11: Multiple ESSA Tier II studies show Newsela products accelerate learning across ELA and social studies

And there's good reason to believe that adding Newsela to your routine can make a difference. Multiple rigorous studies have shown that weekly Newsela use leads to accelerated learning and achievement gains on state tests, NWEA, and i-Ready reading assessments. Those gains were most pronounced in ELA and Social Studies, but the literacy skills that students are building in Newsela are transferable across subjects.

## Slide 12: Newsela helps teachers drive student learning outcomes when used as part of weekly instruction

Now that we've looked at the research, let's look at the execution.

Teachers that use Newsela weekly do so in different ways and for different purposes— some concrete examples of which we'll see in just a moment— but three common themes have emerged that illustrate the flexible, essential role that Newsela can play in your instruction.

You might use Newsela to:

- Give students the opportunity to practice essential literacy skills on content in any discipline
- Build background knowledge around important content standards in ELA, Social Studies, Science, Math, and more

## [Slide 16: Incorporating Newsela Resources](#)

Now that we're logged in, let's learn about how to find content that's right for your classroom and students.

Our first objective in this session is to make sure we're returning to class with resources that support our instruction. We want the process we engage in today to be memorable and replicable. So as we start to build a routine around using Newsela regularly—starting with today—we'll think about:

1. The goals that we're using Newsela to help achieve. These might come from your lesson plan, a unit plan, or your curriculum.
2. What type of content is best for achieving that goal. Is it an explainer article? A video? An opinion piece? A text set?
3. And then, we'll turn to Newsela's Search to determine which resource is best for your class, your students, and your standards.

# Speaker Notes: Slides 24 and 25

## Slide 24: Tools and scaffolds to support every learner

Newsela provides tools and scaffolds to help every learner access texts.

A key element of this accessibility is our lexile leveling. All non-fiction articles are published at 5 different reading levels, so students can read at the level that's right for them. Each article has a four-question quiz that auto-differentiates with the reading level and assesses on two reading skills.

Thousands of our articles are also available in Spanish and also feature the same lexile leveling. Teachers across the country have been using this tool to assign content that is appropriately challenging for their students.

Enabling tools like the paragraph count and read aloud mode also support accessibility and thus comprehension of classroom texts.

## Slide 25: Checks for Understanding

Our new embedded Checks for Understanding feature (CFUs) is a great strategy you can use to encourage students' active reading of a text. The checks serve to help students slow down and make sure they understand what they've read before moving forward.

All news and informational content on Newsela will have 1-4 AI-generated checks for understanding embedded throughout the text. So *if* the teacher chooses to assign them, students will have to answer each question before being able to move on in the text.

Not only do these checks encourage students to slow down, but they also act as a scaffold by chunking information to help them identify and then recall the most critical information in a text. You could also use it as a tool for self-monitoring for students. If it's taking them a few tries to get the information correct, maybe they need to move their seat away from a chatty friend.

## [Slide 26: Quizzes](#)

When you're investigating in our Work Block, play around with tools and features. Every article on Newsela, whether you find it by searching or browsing, will have activities to get your students reading actively— like quizzes.

The quizzes are:

- Differentiated, just like articles
- Aligned to important literacy skills and standards
- There for students to complete on assignments OR as part of independent reading
- A big part of what informs Newsela's Recommended Reading Level—the assessment of each individual student's reading level that automatically differentiates text and quizzes to ensure that every student has appropriately challenging independent reading opportunities

Additionally, you'll find Write prompts in the same panel for short, frequent writing opportunities. They're fully customizable, and we use AI to provide up to 5 topically-relevant suggestions for your considerations too. Fun fact: the level of the text you're viewing affects the write prompts that AI suggests. So more modified versions of the article will offer more simplified write prompts and vice versa.

And annotations allow you and your students to read actively, practice important skills, and make your thinking visible. Just highlight a part of the text, click “Annotate,” and write something. Use this for modeling, embedding supports, or asking questions. Then, require your students do it as part of each Newsela activity to show you they’re doing more than just moving their eyes across the page.

## [Slide 32: Assign Any Text or Text Set](#)

You can create an assignment from any resource with the Assign button (article, video, text set). Just press that button to open the assignment builder above the resource. If you're assigning an article, you'll be able to consult the article beneath the assignment builder by scrolling down.

In your assignment builder you'll be able to make decisions about the title, to whom the assignment goes, what their reading experience is like, instructions you leave, and some additional settings available to you.

## [Slide 33: Students Work in Real Time](#)

All the actions that we direct students to take on assignments (and more!) are available for review in the Assignments tab of your Newsela screen. Just click Assignments and you'll be taken to a screen where you can review:

- When each student access the assignment
- How long they spent reading it
- At which level they did their reading
- How well they performed on the quiz
- Whether they've responded to the write prompt
- If, and how many times, they've highlighted and annotated the text.

Click any of the hyperlinked details to go directly to that piece of student work and provide feedback on student writing and/or annotations.

## [Slide 34: Class Overview Module](#)

Educators are able to view class activity in our class overview module. Newsela equips teachers with insights into their classroom and student performance to prepare instructional next-steps. Perhaps, there is a trend in your class in which students are spending only a 3-4 minutes reading a text. With this insight, you can implement checks for understanding or strategies for students to actively read to help them spend longer analyzing the text.

Administrators can also view our ELA Skills Reporting page. There, they can see student performance on reading skills and plan accordingly. These insights can be critical in planning approaches to literacy development in your district.

# Speaker Notes: Slides 36 and 37

## Slide 36: School and District-Wide Insights

Gain visibility into Newsela use by specific schools, grades, and teachers with Usage Reporting.

As a school leader you have the ability to see insights to understand how Newsela is being used in classrooms. The reports show how frequently students and teachers are using Newsela, how much content they're consuming, and usage of specific features like standards-aligned quizzes and annotations. This is the ideal place to identify if teachers are achieving the goal set forth at the beginning of the year (ex. Using Newsela weekly) and then identify action steps if that goal hasn't been met yet.

You can filter your data by time period, click on charts for more information, and download your reports. The data refreshes once daily, and displays information that is accurate to 48 hours prior to the update.

Our administrator reporting solution is meant to give a higher-level view of Newsela usage across your district, and includes a district level summary, teacher summary, a subject breakdown of article views, and a student summary.
