


What is Newsela Lite

With Newsela Lite, it is free and easy to promote literacy skills, spark discussion, and boost independent reading.






Integrate into weekly instruction





Every week a new text is added here to the homepage, where it will be for four weeks. When a new article is added, one drops.

There are three ways to share or assign content.

Assign


Digitally share with students on their devices, either in small groups or as a whole class. This way, you can review student quizzes, writing prompts, and annotations.

Print

Distribute texts at levels appropriate for your students, with or without activities.

Present

Project content for the whole class or small group instruction.


Set reading levels for students

When creating (digital) assignments, set the reading level for students.

Texts in Newsela are available at 5 different reading levels.

You can set the reading level or let Newsela set it automatically at each student's reading level.

Setting the reading level ensures your students get practice reading and developing skills at grade level. Use the Newsela recommended level as a way to help students work up to grade-level tasks.






Assign standards-aligned quizzes regularly

Quizzes are included with every Newsela Lite article and:

- provide students with immediate feedback
- help teachers track how students are performing with key skills

Quizzes also help inform reading level

After reading five articles and completing quizzes, students will begin to receive articles at their reading level rather than at the grade level of their classroom.


Helps students engage in active learning by highlighting and taking notes within a text.

Suggested routine:

- I do (direct instruction) Use the annotation tool to model skill application during whole-class read or small group instruction.
- We do (guided practice) Invite students to annotate alongside you.
- You do (independent practice) In the assignment instructions, prompt students to use the annotation tool to highlight or comment.

Ideas to use the four highlight colors:

Questions = yellow Main idea = green Key details = blue Connections = pink


Word-by-word highlighting that can be played and paused, in both English and Spanish.

Simple way to differentiate for individuals or specific groups of students.



Targeted and guided skills practice for a small group

Five of your students are struggling with finding the key details in a text. You use small group assignments to give them a high-interest article. As part of the assignment, students use annotations to mark 5 sentences that they believe are key details. You also ask them to explain why they've chosen to annotate those sentences.

After they submit the assignment, you read their responses. You can provide more practice by having them work together to compare and justify their thoughts with others. Additionally, you can model how they can take those key details and put them in their own words to create a summary.
